This student-created club makes sure everyone has a buddy

While attending third grade at Trautwein Elementary, Draigon Schmitt made an observation: He was the only student playing on the playground with classmates with disabilities. He took the initiative to change that through the creation of a Buddy Club.

Draigon, now a fourth-grader, approached School Counselor Fatima Warren with the issue, and together they developed the idea of the Buddy Club to build meaningful friendships between students with and without disabilities.

Draigon created a presentation to pitch the club to Trautwein Elementary School Principal Dr. Shannon Henderson. She loved the idea, and Draigon identified five other students to serve as the founding members of the Buddy Club for the 2021-2022 school year. The Buddy Club has exploded in popularity this year with approximately 30 students participating as buddies.

"Last year I was helping with Chloe, and now she's my best friend," said Amina Mesic, fifth-grade student. "We play together during recess. She loves to play tag."

The buddies meet on Friday mornings before school to develop skills to use when interacting with their new friends. This includes communication strategies to use when working with different students and how to interact throughout the school day.

"The buddies are being inclusive by making sure our students are included outside of their general education setting," said Isabel Briscoe, special education teacher. "They're learning about how to interact and play with them across the school."

The new friendships are beneficial for both members of the buddy pair.

Zayden Jackson, fourth-grade student and member of the Buddy Club loves playing with his buddy. "I like to play tag, play with cars, and play hide and seek," Jackson said.

The Buddy Club also supports students who may be feeling sad or tired. The buddies make sure these students don't feel alone and provide support. They are also school ambassadors for new Trautwein Elementary students.

"We talked about how it felt to be a new student," Warren said. "When we have a new student, we give them a tour of the school and make sure they have a friend and aren't alone."

Next school year will be Draigon's final year at Trautwein Elementary, but he plans to continue making sure all students feel included when he goes to middle and high school.

"I want to continue this until I graduate college," Draigon said. "I also want to pass on the club to people I trust." <u>Click to view video.</u>

Spring presents opportunities to support students and staff

Celebrating our students and staff

This has been a busy and exciting time for Mehlville School District and the Board of Education. It is rewarding as we see the many accomplishments and celebrations of our students and staff. It is also wonderful to see all of the acknowledgements being made via Mehlville Mentions, a program that allows our community to salute any Mehlville School District employee.

Prop E is on the ballot on April 4, 2023

This same optimism is held as we look to a future where we can continue the progress that has been made in our schools. We see education innovation, improved academics, and more student educational choices than ever before. This all happened while practicing fiscal discipline, paying off lease debt early, and improving the safety and security of our facilities.

Over the past year, our district leadership did a salary comparison study that shows that Mehlville lags behind area districts and the region in all areas of our staff's compensation. Subsequently, the district did a community survey that showed overwhelming support for improved salaries for our teachers and support staff.

About 76 percent of the district's budget comes from local taxes, and Mehlville School District has the lowest blended tax rate of all 22 school districts in St. Louis County. Salaries and benefits for district staff comprise more than 80 percent

Three candidates file for Mehlville Board of Education

Three Mehlville School District residents have filed their candidacy for three positions on the Mehlville Board of Education. Candidates include incumbents Jeff Wolman, Peggy Hassler and Jean Pretto.

Typically, when the number of candidates who file is the same as the number of positions to be filled, then there is no election. However, under the provisions of Missouri Statute Section 115.124, the Board of Education election will appear on the ballot because Prop E will be on the ballot. If passed, Proposition E will fund competitive salaries to attract and keep high-quality teachers and support staff at Mehlville School District.

The three board members will be sworn in during the April 13 Organizational Meeting of the Board of Education. They will each serve three-year terms.

Passing Prop E will help us to stabilize our workforce by offering competitive wages for all district employees.

The Board is committed and optimistic that we will be able to select a leader that will maintain our high expectations, will be an advocate for children and public education, will be strategic and data driven, and will energetically lead the Mehlville School district in its continuous growth and improvement.

Mehlville School District finances receive highest opinion from auditors

Jpon review of Mehlville School District's finances for the 2022 fiscal year, auditors from Daniel Jones and Associates issued the district's accounting practices its highest marks, an unmodified opinion, or clean audit.

Auditors issue unmodified opinions to express that financial statements are presented fairly in all material respects and to express that the district has complied with all statutory requirements. Daniel Jones and Associates presented the audit report to the Mehlville Board of Education on Dec. 15, 2022.

"We appreciate an independent auditor affirming our accounting practices," said Mehlville School District Chief Financial Officer Marshall Crutcher. "We take pride in earning and maintaining the community's trust when it comes to financial stewardship."

Mehlville School District currently has the lowest blended tax rate out of the 22 St. Louis County school districts. In fiscal year 2021 (2020-2021 school year), the district spent \$10,082 per student, the second lowest amount of St. Louis County school districts.

Steady progress is being made on Prop S projects

In the November Messenger, we shared with you that several of our Prop S projects have been completed, including the security entrance at Oakville High School, and parking lot safety upgrades at Oakville Elementary School and Rogers Elementary School.

I'm happy to report that since November, we've also completed the following projects:

- Security entrance at Bernard Middle School
- Security entrance at Oakville Elementary School
- Security entrance at Rogers Elementary School

These security entrances are providing safe welcome areas for our school staff to greet and assist visitors, separate from our students and their learning spaces. Construction crews are on schedule and continuing work on the security entrances at Bierbaum Elementary School and Blades Elementary School.

This winter construction began on the safety upgrades for the Mehlville High School ballfield. We anticipate the new ballfield will be complete later this calendar year.

This will be another busy summer for construction at our schools. This spring, we will have several projects

out for bid. One of those bids will be for classroom additions to accommodate the growing population of students at Bierbaum Elementary School. This bid will also include a larger storm shelter than originally planned due to St. Louis County regulations. Other projects will start during the 2023-2024 school year. The last round of projects are slated to start in summer 2024.

We anticipate starting on the security entrances at Hagemann Elementary School, Point Elementary School, Trautwein Elementary School and Washington Middle School this summer.

Dr. Gaines will retire from superintendency in August

Mehlville School District Superintendent Dr. Chris Gaines announced plans to retire August 31, 2023. Dr. Gaines will have completed 28 years in education – including 22 years as a superintendent.

Through the vision and leadership of Dr. Gaines, Mehlville School District has expanded opportunities and choices for students. The district is now known on a national level as a model for personalized student learning.

"I have approached my time in Mehlville with a continuous improvement mindset," Dr. Gaines said. "My desire is, and has been, to leave the district in better condition than it was when I arrived."

During eight years as superintendent for Mehlville School District, Dr. Gaines

- Expanded personalized learning as showcased through MyPath, a high school course that students design around their own interests; participation in the St. Louis Centers for Advanced Professional Studies; the creation of MOSAIC Elementary, a school of innovation; and the launch of Middle School Academies.
- Built trust with the community, as evidenced by the passage of Prop R (a tax increase to restore programs and services), Prop A (a tax transfer to fund roofing projects) and Prop S (the first bond issue supported by the community in almost 30 years).
- Earned the district numerous accolades including being named an AASA Learning 2025 Lighthouse District, selected as a League of Innovative Schools and a National District of Character.

"Dr. Gaines has proven time and again that he is an avid advocate for children and public education," said Board of Education President Peggy Hassler. "He has taken a strategic, data-driven approach to everything he accomplishes in

the district. Through Dr. Gaines' vision and leadership, the Mehlville School District has seen growth and improvement in many areas including academic achievement, community involvement and capital improvement projects. On behalf of the Board of Education, I would like to thank Dr. Gaines for his dedication and leadership and wish him well in his future endeavors."

The Mehlville School District Board of Education hopes to announce the next superintendent in March.

"Although my days as your superintendent are now numbered, I am eager to assist in making this as smooth of a transition as possible," Dr. Gaines said. "Mehlville School District has a bright future and there is still much to achieve."


The Mehlville School District Board of Education voted ■ unanimously to place a tax levy increase on the April 4, 2023, ballot. Prop E asks Mehlville School District voters for an operating levy increase of 31 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Prop E would be used to fund competitive salaries to recruit and retain high-quality teachers and support staff (including bus drivers, custodians, cooks, nurses, front office staff and others) for the students of Mehlville School District.

Why is Prop E needed?

Mehlville School District has the lowest blended tax rate of all 22 school districts in St. Louis County. The district relies on local taxes for more than 75 percent of its budget. Salaries are the district's top expense. Historic levels of inflation along with a low tax rate make it impossible for Mehlville School District to increase salaries to competitive levels without a tax increase.


The impact of a great teacher

"Great teachers can make the biggest impact on kids' lives. Parents will talk in the community and say, I want my kid to have that teacher.' School District is paying its starting teachers \$1,938 less than the average starting teacher salary in other county districts. At higher levels of experience, Mehlville's teacher salaries trail the county average by \$7,585. Teacher resignations (not including retirements) are up over the past four years.



Fewer qualified candidates are applying for open teaching positions at Mehlville School District. It's especially difficult to attract certified math, science, gifted and English language development teachers.

The district faces workforce shortages among support staff **positions.** The district currently is about 85 percent staffed for custodians and bus drivers. The district is also short-staffed in its

Survey results show strong community support for competitive pay for teachers and support staff. Of those who

- 87 percent favor increasing salaries for bus drivers, custodians, cooks, nurses and other support staff to attract and retain these essential workers.
- 85 percent favor increasing teacher salaries to become competitive in the region and to attract and retain high-quality teachers.

A shrinking applicant pool

"Over the years, hiring has become more difficult. I don't see as many people applying for positions. We had a math opening, and only four people applied. Five to seven years ago, we would've had at least 20-30 applicants." - Mike Salsman, Oakville Middle School principal

When is the election?

The election takes place on Tuesday, April 4, 2023.

How will Prop E appear on the ballot?

The ballot language for Proposition E is as follows: Shall the Board of Education of the Mehlville R-9 School District be authorized to increase the operating tax levy of the District for the purposes of increasing employee salaries to become competitive in the region and to attract and retain high-quality teachers and other essential workers; and fund ongoing operating expenses by \$.31 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation? If this proposition is approved, the adjusted operating levy of the District is estimated to be \$3.9884 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation.

How much will Prop E cost homeowners?

Prop E is an operating tax rate increase of 31 cents for each \$100 of assessed home value. Use the chart below to determine how

What happens if Prop E passes?

Voter approval of Prop E would enable Mehlville School District to protect the quality of education and staffing in the district and continue to focus on continuous improvement for its students. A stable teacher workforce positively affects student achievement. Student safety and wellbeing is improved with fully staffed custodial, transportation and other critical support staff positions.

What happens if Prop E fails?

Without the added revenue generated by Prop E, Mehlville School District would likely face continued workforce shortages that threaten the district's ability to provide essential services. The district would likely see a decline in the quality of education it can provide as competition for quality teachers is expected to

When was the last time Mehlville asked voters to increase taxes?

The last time Mehlville School District went to the voters to ask for an operating tax rate increase was in 2015. Proposition R (Restore) was put on the ballot to restore cuts the district had made to programs and services for students. Prop R passed with 72.5% of the votes.

Mehlville School District asked voters for Prop A in April 2016 and Prop S in April 2021. Neither measure increased the tax rate, and both measures were passed.

Prop R, Prop A and Prop S addressed facility needs or restoring staff positions or programs. None of these propositions improved pay to attract and retain staff.




