# **Thank you for passing Prop E!**



Voters in Mehlville School District passed a tax increase in April to support competitive salaries to attract and retain high quality teachers and support staff. Prop E passed with 63.63 percent of the votes.

The passage of Prop E increases taxes by 31 cents for each \$100 of assessed value or by about \$12 per month for a home appraised at \$250,000. Competitive pay increases go into effect for the 2023-2024 school year.

"Prop E is making our schools stronger by allowing us to invest in all of our employees through competitive compensation," said Dr. Shannon Pike, executive director of human resources. "These pay increases will help us keep our talented staff and recruit the best and brightest new teachers and support staff."

Improved pay is reflected in the teacher and classified salary schedules for the 2023-2024 school year. Those schedules can be viewed on the district website, <a href="https://bit.ly/msdr9propesalaries">bit.ly/msdr9propesalaries</a>.

Here are some highlights:

- First year teachers in Mehlville School District will make \$46,000 next year, up from \$41,500. This puts Mehlville in line with districts like Lindbergh, Kirkwood, Parkway and Rockwood.
- All support staff positions start with an hourly salary of at least \$15.
- School food positions will start at \$15.50, up from \$13.85 per hour.
- Custodians start at \$16.25, up from \$14 per hour.
- Bus drivers start at \$18.55, up from \$17 per hour.

"To provide a high quality education, we have to attract and retain high quality educators and support staff," said Dr. Chris Gaines, superintendent. "Our community has chosen to make a critical investment in our children by passing Prop E. We are incredibly grateful for voter support."

As the school year comes to an end, the Board of Education would like to take a moment to reflect on the incredible accomplishments we have achieved. Through collective effort, we are proud to report that our schools have continued to provide a high-quality education. Our teachers and staff have gone above and beyond to support our students both academically and emotionally. We are grateful for their dedication and hard work. ## Prop E is strengthening our schools

We have also approved the 2023-2024 administrator salaries to be competitive with surrounding districts. The Board of Education looks forward to considering nurse salary schedules at a June meeting.

# Dr. Jeff Haug will serve as Mehlville School District's next superintendent

The Mehlville Board of Education unanimously selected Dr. Jeff Haug as the district's superintendent beginning July 1, 2023. Dr. Haug will replace Dr. Gaines, who is retiring after serving as superintendent for the past eight years.

Dr. Haug currently is the chief operations officer for Special School District of St. Louis County, where he has worked since 2020. In that



role, he supervises district finance, business, purchasing, state data reporting, transportation, maintenance, security and food service departments. Prior to that, he served as chief financial officer for Meramec Valley R-III School District in Pacific, Mo., for three years. He's been an assistant superintendent for instruction in Hazelwood School District, has seven years of experience as a middle school principal and started his educational career as a social studies teacher at St. Dominic High School. He has also taught at McCluer North High school in the Ferguson-Florissant School District.

Dr. Haug holds a doctorate degree and a Master of Arts in Educational Leadership from Lindenwood University. He earned a Bachelor of Science in History from Truman State University.

The Board's selection of Dr. Haug followed a national search conducted by EGL Association. The candidate evaluation process was based on staff and parent input around their priorities for the new superintendent and the skills and experiences that person should have. Several highly qualified candidates applied for superintendent.

"Mehlville is a proud district with a noteworthy tradition of educational excellence," said Board President Peggy Hassler. "It was clear that Dr. Haug is very student-centered. We were impressed with his desire to collaborate and continue to build effective teams that will make a difference in our schools. We are confident Dr. Haug's diverse background, experience and personal qualities will be a significant contribution in Mehlville School District's journey to
